HOMEWORK POLICY

Introductory Statement

This policy was formulated following a survey completed by parents and collated by a teacher group.

Rationale

Teachers felt that we needed an official homework policy.

Relationship to Characteristic Spirit of School

We in St. Brigid's feel that homework encourages pupils to work independently and take responsibility for their own work.

Aims

- 1. To benefit student learning
- 2. To reinforce work done in class
- 3. To develop study skills
- 4. To promote a similar approach to homework across all classes
- 5. To strengthen links between home and school

Guidelines

Classes to get homework: Senior Infants to 6th Class

Content: Junior Infants Occasional, informal oral work

Senior Infants Reading

Regular worksheets

1st and 2nd Reading

Spellings Tables

Regular written work

3rd and 4th Reading

Spellings Tables Maths

Regular written work

5th and 6th Reading

Spellings Tables Maths Oral learning Regular written work

Guidelines contd.

• Provision is made for children with special needs. Class teacher and support teacher will liaise to provide appropriate homework

- Homework is seen as a reinforcement of work done in class
- All classes from 1st to 6th have a Homework Journal
- Homework is to be signed by parents and teacher to decide on frequency of same
- Homework is given Monday to Thursday but there can be exceptions to this
- Suggested length of time:

 Senior Infants
 10 minutes

 1st and 2nd
 20-30 minutes

 3rd and 4th
 35-45 minutes

 5th and 6th
 45-60 minutes

- Homework is always checked by the class teacher
- Exemption from homework may be used as a system of rewards. Poor quality or incomplete homework may be sent home to be re-done / completed
- Pupils have a responsibility to ensure they have taken down and have the necessary books etc. for homework
- If pupils have a problem with the homework they should make the teacher aware of this as soon as possible
- Parents' role in establishing a routine for homework place and time. Preventing interruptions is vital
- Parents should monitor homework appropriately in consultation with class teacher
